Executive Power: Too Much or Just Enough?

These activities will provide background knowledge into Executive Power using Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) order as a current example.

Students will be required to:

- 1) Write a letter to the new President Elect (Joe Biden) of the United States; and
- 2) Create a political cartoon.

Counts as an assessment for Semester II out of 50 pt.

Before you write your letter and design your political cartoon, you must visit each link listed below. **Watch videos carefully and take notes**. Read the content slowly and re-read of anything is confusing the first time around. Keep in mind that your goal is to form an opinion about the extent of Executive Power as well as your position on whether to keep DACA or rescind DACA.

This letter should tell the President:

- A) how you feel about Executive Power in general; and
- B) why you support DACA or why you think it should be thrown out.

500 word minimum (not repetitive) with proper spelling and grammar, with sufficient facts and evidence from the resources above (CITE WHERE NECESSARY).

2. After writing the letter:

Design your political cartoon and submit as an image file.

The score on the cartoon will be graded on how well the image lets the reader know how well it captures the essence of your feelings about DACA in your letter to the President - not on artistic ability.
